# LIFESPRING: SAUGERTIES ADULT LEARNING COMMUNITY COVID POLICY

### Introduction

The health and safety of our Members and Presenters continues to be of paramount importance to Lifespring, and the Lifespring Covid policy has been formulated with this in mind. Remember that it is each individual's decision to attend in-person programming with the understanding that in doing so they take responsibility for their own safety and well-being and assume the associated risk.

This policy went into effect August 1, 2022, amended December 13, 2022. Lifespring reserves the right to amend this policy as needed to meet changing Covid conditions. Members will be notified accordingly of any policy changes.



## Vaccination Requirements for In-Person Courses or Events

Prior to registering for any in-person courses or events, members and presenters must provide proof of **two vaccinations and at least one booster shot** (also known as a third vaccination).

NOTE: These vaccinations may be two Moderna or two Pfizer or a combination of one Moderna and one Pfizer, and a third dose of either Moderna or Pfizer or another FDA-approved vaccine that may be available. Or the vaccinations may be one Johnson and Johnson plus a second and third dose of either Moderna or Pfizer or another FDA-approved vaccine that may be available.

### Proof of Vaccination

Proof of vaccination may be a CDC Covid

Vaccination Record Card(s) showing proof of
vaccinations and a booster shot or the Digital New

York State Excelsior Pass Plus showing proof of
vaccinations and a booster shot.

## Submitting Proof of Vaccination

All members and presenters will be contacted by email if they have not previously submitted proof of vaccination and will be instructed how to submit this proof online. Proof of vaccination must be received by March 18, 2023 in order to register for any spring 2023 in-person classes or events. Email registrar@lifespringsaugerties.com with questions.

### Masks

**Masks** that cover both the nose and mouth must be worn at all times for **in-person** courses and events. **Speakers and Performers** may be unmasked during the presentation or performance, but all others will remain masked.

### Social Distancing

Social Distancing must be practiced at all times during an **in-person** course or event. Seating at the Woodstock Jewish Congregation or any other indoor venues will be set up to insure 3 feet of social distance from each other and from the Presenters or Performers. Presenters and Performers must maintain the 3 feet minimum distance from the audience.

### **Outdoors**

Masks and Social Distancing at **outdoor** courses or events are encouraged but are not required, at this time.

### Food and Drink

No Consumption of Food or Drink will be allowed at any **in-person**, **indoor** course or event.

### Online Courses

Lifespring encourages Members who register for Zoom courses to submit proof of vaccination, which will be on record for future 2022-2023 in-person opportunities in which members may wish to participate.

## Lifespring Vaccination ID

All Lifespring Members and Presenters who have submitted proof of vaccination will be provided with a **Proof of Vaccination ID Badge**, which must be shown at any in-person course or event in order to gain admittance to each session.

### Positive Covid Test Notification

If a participant at any Lifespring in-person course or event (either indoor or outdoor) tests positive for Covid, within 10 days after attending the in-person course or event, the member is asked to immediately notify Lifespring by sending an email to registrar@lifespringsaugerties.com so that other participating members can be informed of the possible exposure to Covid. The privacy of the person testing positive will be respected and their name will remain undisclosed.

To safeguard the Lifespring community as much as possible, the individual who tested positive must provide proof of a negative Covid test for re-admission to in-person courses or events.

The earliest re-admission to courses or events will be 10 days after a negative test.

### Limited Enrollment

A perennial favorite Presenter for Lifespring returns to tackle the age-old question about *Othello*: How did Shakespeare take a comic scenario and turn it dark? How does what is implausible become plausible before our eyes? As in past courses, participants and the Presenter work together to make prolific observations about how the play is written and designed and try to untie the old knots.

Participants should purchase any edition of *Othello* with scene and line numbers included. The Presenter is using the paperback Signet Classics edition edited by Alvin Kernan.

### **Presenter**

Rosemary Deen did her graduate work at the University of Michigan, where she studied with the Shakespeare scholar Hereward T. Price, and at the University of Chicago. She is retired from the English department of Queens College, CUNY. The poet Marie Ponsot and Ms. Deen developed a radical innovative approach to the teaching of writing in two books, one of which won a national award. She gives workshops in writing and reading and has published a book of essays, Naming the Light.

# A3 A Look at China: Chinese Life, History, Politics, and Influence on the World

MONDAY: April 17, 24, May 1, 8, 15, 22 9:30 am - 10:45 am

### **ONLINE ZOOM**

Beginning with an overview of China today and a comparison to the United States, participants will travel back to key moments in the last 120 years of China's history, then delve into the impact of Mao Zedong and the Cultural Revolution. The journey will continue with a look at the rise of Modern China and its influence in the world. We will spend time considering the current government of China before exploring some pressing contemporary issues facing the country today such as the trade war, Taiwan, and human rights.

### **Presenter**

Gary Bischoff is a retired electronics engineer, business owner, and former adjunct professor at SUNY New Paltz, who has been to China 18 times since 2007. He speaks Chinese at an intermediate level and is in regular communication with colleagues in China talking about everyday life, government and politics, food, culture and, of course, the Chinese and English language. He studied Chinese at Mandarin Morning, Shanghai; Keats Chinese School, Kunming; the Chinese Learning Institute, Guilin; and Chinese Politics and Political Science at Hong Kong University of Technology and Science.

# A4 Landmark Literature of the 1920s

MONDAY: April 17, 24, May 1, 8, 15, 22 9:30 am - 10:45 am

#### **ONLINE ZOOM**

The Roaring `20s saw the production of some of the greatest and most important literature of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. Writers of the decade set a high standard of imagination and achievement in poetry, fiction, and drama. Although the cornucopia of outstanding work is more than one semester can address, this course will offer a survey of the literary legacy of the decade, with select in-depth explorations. The astonishing list of notable authors to be explored include T. S. Eliot, James Joyce, Edith Wharton, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Virginia Woolf, Langston Hughes, Eugene O'Neill, Ernest Hemingway, William Faulkner, and Gertrude Stein.

### **Presenter**

Chuck Mishaan has been developing a syllabus examining the intellectual, political, and artistic history of Western Europe from the Enlightenment to the present. He has presented his popular multi-semester classroom series on Opera as Politics and his study of the Roaring '20s at Lifespring and many other area LLIs. He was an Adjunct Professor at NYU and has been a lecturer at the Bardavon Opera House and at the Rhinebeck Chamber Music Society. This spring marks the eighth consecutive year of his talks on the intersection of politics and the arts.

# B1 Philosophy and Literature: Moral Choice

MONDAY: April 17, 24, May 1, 8, 15, 22 11:30 am - 12:45 pm

### **ONLINE ZOOM**

This is the second of a series in Philosophy and Literature. For this course, we will look at moral choice through the philosophy of virtue in Aristotle's Nicomachean Ethics, and we will read two sets of literary works: Sophocles' Theban Plays (Oedipus Rex, Oedipus at Colonus, Antigone) and a contemporary novel, Home Fire, by Kamila Shamsie, a British author of Pakistani heritage. Home Fire is a modern re-telling of the Antigone story. Issues the course will explore include love, loyalty, citizenship, identity, justice, appeasement, assimilation, and others.

After registration, participants will receive a list of text sources for the course, including e-texts and online bookstores.

### Presenter

Lydia Edelhaus has taught philosophy and psychology courses at SUNY New Paltz and Marist College. At the same time, she has also worked in nonprofit mental health crisis counseling and advocacy services for several decades. She has graduate degrees in psychology and philosophy, and she is particularly interested in life's ethical dilemmas and the philosophical and psychological structures of moral choice.

## B2 Banned Books

### MONDAY: April 17, 24, May 1, 8, 15, 22; 11:30 am - 12:45 am ONLINE ZOOM

The banning of books has a long and thought-provoking history. In today's world, it has taken on new meaning as some cities and states remove books from schools, library boards and parents argue, politicians enter the fray, librarians are threatened, and readers stand in the middle. What is at stake? How does the history of book bans effect today's problems? How are our children and grandchildren affected? What are the impacts of book bans? These topics will be examined and discussed by eight distinguished Presenters.

**NOTE:** The course includes a voluntary bonus discussion on May 31<sup>st</sup> at 7:00 pm via Zoom, open to course members who have read one or more of the six banned books on the list sent to all participants upon registration. Our virtual "wine and cheese" facilitated discussion will focus on why these books have been banned, in the context of what we have learned during the course.

#### **Presenters**

Amy Smith has a Ph.D. in history and is the Head of Programs and Youth Services at the Red Hook Public Library. She was honored as Red Hook Citizen of the Year by the Rotary Club for her hard work and contributions on behalf of her community.

Sally Dwyer-McNulty is a Professor of History at Marist College. She earned her Ph.D. in American history at Temple University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Her fields of study included US religious history, women's history, US foreign policy, and Latin American history.

Maxwell Nosbisch has a long-time commitment to civic engagement and our First Amendment rights, which led him to the First Amendment Museum in Augusta, Maine, where he is the Manager of Visitor Experiences. A frequent speaker on the First Amendment, he studied Historic Preservation and Community Planning at the College of Charleston in Charleston, SC, and received his Master's in Historic Preservation and certificates in Museum Studies and Cultural Landscape Conservation from the University of Georgia.

Ginger Tebo is Director of the School Library System and Director of the Learning Resource Center for St. Lawrence-Lewis BOCES. She has an M.S. in Library Science from the University of Pittsburgh and a Certificate of Advanced Study from Syracuse University. Margie Menard is Director of the Kingston Public Library and has an M.S in Library Science from Southern Connecticut University.

Suzanna Hermans is a second-generation bookseller and co-owner of Oblong Books and Music in Millerton and Rhinebeck, New York. She is a past president of the New England Independent Booksellers Association and recently served on the Advisory Council of the American Booksellers Foundation for Free Expression. In 2017, she was a judge for the National Book Award for Young People's Literature.

Anastasia Higginbotham is an author and illustrator whose books have been challenged and censored. Her book, Not My Idea: A Book About Whiteness caused such an uproar in the Texas state legislature that it was blamed for censorship legislation that passed in that state. Her Ordinary Terrible Things children's book series dealing with difficult topics launched in 2015 with Divorce Is the Worst. Her work has been featured in The Believer, The New York Times, Huffington Post, Women's Media Center, The Women's Review of Books, and in anthologies.

Lyndsey Dussling is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker with an M.S. in Social Work from New York University. She is an ally of LGBTQ communities and provides services for teens and adults.

# B3 Comedy: Selected Origins and Highlights

### **ONLINE ZOOM**

### **Limited Enrollment**

What makes us laugh? This course highlights the subject of comedy dating back to ancient Greece and the Hebrew Bible. Together we will examine theories of why we laugh and look at comedy in vaudeville, on the radio, in the movies, and on television, including a class devoted to stand-up comedians like Totie Fields and Joan Rivers who learned their craft entertaining in nightclubs and hotels before their big break. Please be prepared to remember, reflect, and LAUGH!

**\*NOTE:** This is a five-session course that ends at 1:00 pm

### **Presenter**

Abe Vorensky possesses a lifelong love of comedy that began when he worked as an MC at a hotel in the Catskill Mountains where he sang, told jokes, and introduced other entertainers. Through the years, Abe has remained an enthusiastic humor and comedy historian focusing on how comedy has played a role in our personal, social, and political thought. In recent years, along with his classes at Carnegie Mellon University, Abe has taught courses on Comedy History for Lifelong Learning Institutes at Temple, Carnegie-Mellon, Rutgers, UConn, Tufts, and Dartmouth, in person or on Zoom.

# B4 Land, Liberty, and Loss: Echoes of the American Revolution

MONDAY: April 17, 24, May 1, 8, 15, 22 11:30 am - 12:45 pm

### **ONLINE ZOOM**

Land, Liberty, and Loss is meant to prompt reflection on assumptions about human connectedness between the natural and built environments, and to allow us to reconsider, in a holistic sense, how the Revolution that resulted in the United States connects to or disrupts Indigenous histories, our use of natural resources, our political development, and national expansion. We will engage in in-depth discussion and analysis of several texts that explore our nation's founding and how its history—or more pointedly, its misapprehensions of that history, often serves as an obstacle to full democratic and civic flourishing.

After registration, participants will receive a list of text sources for the course.

#### **Presenter**

Martin Haber is a semi-retired teacher with an avid interest in history and the humanities who continues his role as an educator serving as a substitute for the Onteora Central School District. Prior to his semi-retirement, he served for more than thirty years as a middle and high school special education teacher in the New York City Public Schools. During his tenure at John Dewey High School in Brooklyn, he began a multicultural club, instituted the school's first Human Rights Day and Fair, and involved his students in the 92<sup>nd</sup> Street Y's Schools Partnership Program. At the college level, he has taught at a variety of NYC area colleges and universities as well as for the NYC United Federation of Teachers' Professional Development Program.

C1 b. 1876, d. 1929: The Legacy of our Great-Grandparents

WEDNESDAY: April 19, 26, May 3, 10, 17, 24 9:30 am - 10:45 am

The times during which we live have a profound impact on how we see the world, the choices available to us, and the innovative ideas and technology that we either accept or reject. While there are obvious differences between one decade and another or one lifetime and another, there are similarities that connect one generation to another generation. 1876–1929 is a lifetime. It is the time of our Great Grandparents whose experiences colored our view of the world because our own parents knew them. This course will follow one lifetime as it navigates the forces of history that swirl about it, just as our lifetime experiences will be lessons for our Grandchildren.

### **Presenter**

Donn Avallone taught Regents and AP American History, AP American Government, and college level Introduction to Criminal Justice in his 37-year career at Kingston High School. He has also taught American History and Government at UCCC and at area prisons and Social Studies Methods courses at SUNY New Paltz.

C2 Mah Jongg for Beginners

### **Limited Enrollment**

Mah Jongg, a game in which players match or sequence sets of tiles, has been called China's national pastime, but its rise as a globally-beloved game has its roots in the emergence of modern American culture in the 1920s. This hands-on course is an introduction to the game of Mah Jongg, including some if its history, legends, and lore. Participants will focus on playing according to the rules and regulations of the National Mah Jongg League.

NOTE: Prior to the start of the course, participants must purchase a 2023 Mah Jongg card from the https://www.nationalmahjonggleague.org/
The cost is \$14.

### **Presenter**


### **Presenters**

#### **Musicians**

Megan Barbera is a songwriter informed by folk, roots music and the singer-songwriter tradition. She is a 2021 International Songwriting Competition semi-finalist, and her songs have been featured in ad placements with brands such as Naturalizer Shoes, San Miguel Beverage Co. and Australian clothing designer Mela Purdie. She has released three studio albums, the most recent of which was recorded and produced by Grammy-nominated engineer, Julie Last. Megan holds a master's degree in clinical social work from the University of Denver. In both facets of her work as a performing songwriter and therapist, she is a longstanding advocate for creativity, mental health, and kindness. She is currently working on a new album with Brad Armstrong.

Brad Armstrong is a songwriter and performer from Birmingham, AL. He received an MFA in poetry from Syracuse University in 2000 and has spent the last twenty-five years making records and touring. He was a founding member of the band 13ghosts from 1998–2012, a member of the Dexateens from 2006–present, and has released three solo albums between 2016 and 2022. His work has received critical praise from Pitchfork, San Francisco Bay Guardian, Paste, Vice Magazine, and many others. His music has been featured in such television shows as Kingdom and Nashville. He is currently working on a new album with Megan Barbera.

Carol Becker serves as Secretary on the HVFG
Board of Directors and has also chaired the
Dutchess County Interfaith Council's annual music
festival for the past six years, after a rewarding
35-year career as an elementary school teacher.
Often singing the lead part, her unaffected soprano
voice provides a perfect contrast to the male
voices in the group.

Rich Keyes has held several HVFG board positions, and he currently manages their social media accounts. Besides his efforts on banjo and bass, he also plays guitar, is an avid film buff, works part time as a computer tester, and volunteers at the Friends of the Poughkeepsie Public Library District Book Store.

Ken Sheehan toured and recorded with NRBQ as their lead guitarist, and then went on to develop computational software for industrial measurement, holding a number of patents in the field. He also enjoys racing sailboats, and served as dimensional analyst for Dennis Conner's America's Cup Team.

Linda Sheehan owned and operated her own dance studio for more than 25 years, teaching a variety of styles and presenting her students in annual, choreographed dance recitals. She also choreographed a number of regional musical theater productions. Currently, Linda adds light percussion to the group's songs and arrangements.
